We have a great Friendly Fourth planned this month: Our usual food and fellowship + a talk by Carolee Duckworth + Music Circle.



Plymouth Friends Join the 2024 Multi-Church Servants At Work (SAW) Home Building Project

David Miller reports:

We did it. With the leadership of Bethel Hill Methodist church and volunteers from the surrounding faith communities including Plymouth Friends Meeting, we completed the framing of a duplex house in just a few hours on a Friday evening and Saturday. Approximately 100 volunteers followed the cut by number and assemble by printed patterns on the lumber to build more than 150 walls for these two-family homes.

The framed walls from last year and this year's build went to a Habitat for Humanity project in Reading Pa. A dead-end street with 10 building lots on it has been transformed with the installation of 4 out of the 5 planned duplex homes. On Wednesday April 10th representatives of Plymouth Friends attended the Open House ceremonial passing of the keys to the new families for the duplex we built last year. Once the walls are assembled at Bethel Hill Church, they are loaded on trucks and taken to the building site. Habitat for Humanity then oversees the assembly of the buildings using a mixture of volunteers and contractors to complete the work. Each home in the duplex has 3 bedrooms, 1 ½ baths, laundry, kitchen with a breakfast nook (triple window wall). The buildings are constructed with low maintenance materials and have air conditioning and gas heat (both of which are donated by a local family company).

A Letter From the PMFS School Committee

On Tuesday, May 7th the PMFS School Committee had the great pleasure of spending the day at PMFS; wandering the campus, visiting classrooms, and witnessing firsthand the exceptional teaching, the engaged learning, and the joyful relationships between students and teachers. For those of you unfamiliar with the School Committee, we are the school's Board of Trustees. Most of us have a direct relationship with PMFS, either as current parents, parents of alums, being an alum ourselves, or being a former faculty or staff member. Several of us are members of Plymouth Monthly Meeting or other area Quaker Meetings. A handful of us are or were educators at the elementary, high school or college level. Our love of PMFS is what brought us to School Committee and is what inspires us every day as we work to ensure both the short-term and long-term success of the school.

We are grateful to Brenda and to the faculty for extending the invitation for us to visit; 2019 was the last time School Committee had this opportunity as a whole body! Across the board, everything we saw on Tuesday reinforced for us what a special place Plymouth is. We wanted to share with you some of the experiences that trustees lifted up as highlights of their visit.

We saw **Pre-K** students working on organizing and communicating their thoughts during Drama class, figuring out how to aim and slide rocks down a sliding board so they fell into a waiting pot during recess, and excitedly giving visitors a tour of every inch of their classroom. We saw **Kindergarten** enthusiastically engaged in Spanish class, including some beautiful singing; and proudly showing off their skills on the playground, from swinging so high they touched the leaves of a tree, to hanging upside down and traversing the monkey bars.

We saw **1st graders** energetically cheering each other on as they practiced the various events that will be part of Friday's Field Day, and then bring equal enthusiasm to singing and counting in Spanish class. We also saw them thinking hard as they practiced 4-digit subtraction problems using unifix cubes and counting backwards. After their return from a trip to Woodmere Art Museum, we saw our bookloving **2nd graders** engaged in thoughtful teacher-guided conversation about their Listening book, the plot of which they recounted to one trustee with so much detail, she felt like she had read it herself! We saw our **3rd graders** spend their whole recess fervently working together on a student-initiated graphic novel featuring a character inspired by one of our Pre-K teachers. They also showed great concentration and balance as they practiced the egg relay race in P.E.

We saw our 4th **graders** in Science class, testing and refining their balloon car designs for an upcoming race; and we saw them in Art as they worked on original designs to submit for this year's Strawberry Festival T-shirt contest. We saw **5th and 6th graders** working together on a large prop for the upcoming 6th Grade Production, and engaging intently in their conversation skills activity and verbs/adjectives exercises with their enthusiastic Spanish teacher. We also saw our determined and focused **6th graders** growing in confidence as they practiced for their upcoming production.

What a gift it was to be on campus and to be reminded that everything we do, we do for the children of PMFS. As one of our trustees often says, "The world needs Plymouth." We and the faculty of PMFS are aligned in our mission to provide children in their most formative years with a joyful learning environment that inspires a lifetime of asking questions, seeking others' perspectives, and always leading with the heart. We are grateful to all of the parents of Plymouth for entrusting our school with your greatest treasures.

We look forward to seeing everyone at the Strawberry Festival!
