Memorial Service for George (Skip) Corson Saturday, June 8 at 10:30 A.M.



Members and attenders of Plymouth Monthly Meeting send their sincere condolences to the family of Skip Corson.

Skip was a story teller who linked us to our past (both its history and wisdom), thereby helping us understand the challenges of today. His smile drew you into the story as he explained each of the protagonists in it. A bit of humor, a bit of the hard facts and always an optimism that one could apply the past to the current and future as we live into our stories.

Skip was a lifelong vocal supporter of Friends Education. It was important to him that Quaker schools continue to provide for the current generation what had been special to him. Never stuck in the past, he supported many of the current needs of today such as a fundraising drive to bring better technology to education but also supported the many unique ways our teachers find to be fully creative with their students.

His diversity of interests outside of his professional life can only be listed by his many friends that interfaced with him in all those venues of his life. One could find him late at night still sitting in a public meeting supporting citizens that sought and finally prevailed in changing the use of the Abolition Hall land from commercial development to open space, art studio classes and historical interpretation. Skip lent his discernment to the Philadelphia Travel and Witness granting group helping PYM Friends traveling in religious service. Between these two venues are so many others that his friends and colleagues are thankful to him for.

Skip gave a bit of himself to all of us. Each in our own way continue his tradition of linking past to present. Skip's spirit will continue to inform and provide guidance to us as we create our future one with another.

Obituary

George ("Skip") Corson, Jr., 88, of Blue Bell, PA died on May 21, 2024 at Meadowood's Holly House of complications from leukemia. Born in Plymouth Meeting, PA, he was the only son of the late Judge George C. Corson, Sr. and Jane Webb Corson. He graduated from William Penn Charter School in 1952, from Amherst College in 1956, with a major in German and a minor in drama, and from the University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1959. He married Elizabeth ("Betsy") Strayer in 1962 (she passed away in 2006), and is survived by their four children, Tacy, Ben, Julia and Nick, and by his five grandchildren Mikko, Clare, Will, Lily and Calder and his later life partner, Penny Brodie and their dog, Bear.



Deborra Sines Pancoe will be retiring from the Friends Council on Education this month after 20 years of creative work to sustain and creatively grow Friends Education. Plymouth Monthly Meeting sends their appreciation for the many years of devotion to Friends Education community dating back long before the 20 years' service with the Council. Deborra's cheerfulness flows from her smile that draws people into conversations which lead to creativity and solutions that always has the student and teacher at its heart.

Executive Director Drew Smith began his part of the celebration by visualizing the "ripples" of her impact that "will continue for generations." "There is not one part of our current work of Friends Council – deepening the Quaker nature and character of our schools – that was not initiated or influenced by Deborra's service." Some examples of areas of her work are found in Meeting-School Care Relationship publication; Educators New to Quakerism workshop; Peer networks; Community Conversations on Race; Membership Renewal Process, SPARC/Spirited Life and Renewed Courage leadership program. "The careful way in which Friends Council leads you to experience Quakerism firsthand grows out Deborra's careful and creative planning."

Land Acknowledgement Working Group

The Land Acknowledgement Working Group has been meeting since November 2022 at the direction of the Monthly Meeting to begin the process of developing a meaningful Land Acknowledgement. The working group followed the guidance of multiple indigenous groups to guide them into process that would not be a rote citation of a few sentence at the beginning of our Meetings:

- Education of Indigenous History prior to first contact and in relationship to European settlers and United States government
- Develop relationships
- Sharing knowledge
- Adopt a public statement that
 - o acknowledges the people whose land we live on
 - \circ that they continue to live here and, in the diaspora away from the Delaware valley
 - that we desire to have a relationship with them that acknowledges our settler roots, the miss-steps of prior relational events including Quaker Boarding Schools
 - o that we seek ways to support current Lenape and Indigenous initiatives
 - learning Lenape perspective of stewardship of land, water and air.
- Develop a set of Queries and seek the discernment of the Monthly Meeting to include them in the Monthly Rotation of Queries considered at the beginning of our Meetings for Business

At the June Business meeting we will provide a short summary of the activities we have engaged in to address the multiple objectives above. At the business Meeting we will request approval of the proposed minute of Land Acknowledgement and set of Queries to be added to those considered during Business Meetings. These documents will be sent out to the Monthly Meeting prior to the Business Meeting to allow review by the Monthly Meeting.

Heeding God's Call Organization

Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence[™] seeks to energize the American faith community and actively seek an end to gun violence through public witness and policy advocacy. Heeding promotes public witness and call to action through Gun Violence Awareness Days, Murder Site Witness events, and Memorials to the Lost®. These engagements offer opportunities for education as well as for individual and community healing. Heeding works through faithful public policy advocacy. Each engagement mobilizes people toward policy that includes voter guides, letter writing campaigns, and direct, in-person lobbying. Once interfaith community members are educated, they are ready to participate in advocacy that involves visiting their legislators in Harrisburg. Public witness calls to action, and policy advocacy allow *Heeding* to build a campaign by involving the public, media, and legislators to enact common sense gun laws like One Handgun a Month.



A few facts about Guns in America

- We manufacture an average of 9,458,172 guns annually (average 2012 to 2015)
 That's 25,912 per day or 1 gun every 3 seconds
- US has 5 % of the World's population but 42% of all privately owned guns
- Only 32% of the population own guns. Of that population 3% own an average of 17 guns or a total of 133 million guns
- In 2022, there were more than 48,000 firearm-related deaths in the United States. That's about 132 people dying from a firearm-related injury each day
- Average number of firearm suicides per month is 69 (slight variation by month of year)
- Men account for 86% of all victims of firearm death and 87% of firearm injuries.
- Firearm injuries (all types), were among the five leading causes of death for people ages 1-44 in the U.S.
- Firearm injuries were the leading cause of non-disease related death among children and teens ages 1-19.

Ongoing suffering in Gaza

The war grinds on in Gaza with its associated violence in the West bank. We do what we can to alive the suffering and promote a path that brings peace, justice, dignity and respect. Our contributions feel small in the face of the destruction, grieving and anger yet to each and every one that is touched, hope for another day is given.

The small donations from countless numbers of people and organizations such as our Meeting have provided basic needs through the efforts of United Palestinian Appeal (UPA) and the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC).

Our AFSC has provided vital aid to



more than 360,299 people. No longer having hospitals to minister to the people's needs health care is provided by UPA and AFSC in the streets and camp tents. AFSC Food parcels were provided to 200 families with children with cancer and autism, reaching more than 1,400 people. Each of those parcels contained one kilogram of meat, rice, and dates.

Our school in Ramallah has a new head, Rania Maayeh. In her welcome letter to the students on summer break she writes of the pride that people have for the history and values that the school has taught. Addressing the current challenges of the war and violence in the West bank she writes:

"In the past year, our nation and our world have experienced a series of crises among the most difficult and challenging in the school's 152-year-old history. COVID-19, another war on Gaza, an uprising throughout the country, and recent events of suppression of free speech in Palestine has affected the school's community in countless ways. However, we are resilient – enduring and growing through times of turmoil, threat, and challenge. And, we have an extraordinary capacity for renewal, reinventing ourselves and leaning into our inner Light to guide us and drive us to reach new heights. This is our commitment to our children, society, and country."
