News from the Meeting Worship and Ministry



Friends, as we engage our world in these times that "are a changing", let our first motion be love. Consider the words of Thomas Kelly as we talk about people or engage in conversations and actions:

...the grounds of the social responsibility and social sensitivity of Friends, ... is not humanitarianism. It is not in mere pity. It is not in mere obedience to Bible commands. It is not in anything earthly.

The social concern of Friends is grounded in an experience – an experience of the Love of God ... Social concern is the dynamic Life of God at work in the world, made special and emphatic and unique, particularized in each individual or group who is sensitive and tender in the leading-strings of love. Its execution is in peace and power and astounding faith and joy, for in unhurried serenity the Eternal is at work in the midst of time...

Urgent Need for Rental Assistance

The rapid changes occurring in Washington impacts have come to Montgomery County. As a Monthly Meeting and as individuals of our Monthly Meeting, we have been supporting local organizations that help prevent homelessness in our community and help those who are currently unhoused. With the current cutbacks in Federal support, as of March 3rd, Montgomery County has not received the budgeted funding disbursement for January and February. Funding for permanent supportive housing that was supposed to arrive has not. This leaves about 400 currently housed Montgomery County neighbors at risk of eviction including 120 children.



There has been no response from HUD to county officials asking why the funds have not been received, or if they will be sent in the future. With the loss of funding the County program "Your Way Home" will not be able to support the nine local nonprofits that provide housing or assist to people who are at risk of losing their housing.

Our county officials are continuing to work with Federal entities to obtain the budgeted funding. However, in the interim there is an urgent need to assist the agencies that help our fellow citizens by raising funds through public donations. If not raised evictions will begin. The importance of maintaining a home for people is shown by this statistic evaluating the effectiveness of the program: **Between 2020 and 2022, 84% of Rapid Rehousing clients have maintained permanent housing stability after exiting the program and have not returned to homelessness**.

Right Relationship Working Group

As part of our Right Relationship Queries this monthly section of the newsletter provides information about our Indigenous neighbors, their history, current affairs and cultural opportunities. **Field trip to Carlisle Bording School** - A visit to the Carlisle Bording School and cemetery will occur on Memorial Day weekend. From 1879 until 1918, more than 10,000 Native American children were removed from their families across 140 tribes and sent to Carlisle Boarding school for cultural erasure known as "kill the Indian and same the man (woman)". Carpooling for the one-day event will occur on Saturday May 34th. This is an early announcement because to visit the school requires entering the US Army War College military base. To enter the base prior registration and paperwork must be filed. More information will be provided next month.


Annual Party April 26 – Save the Date
